

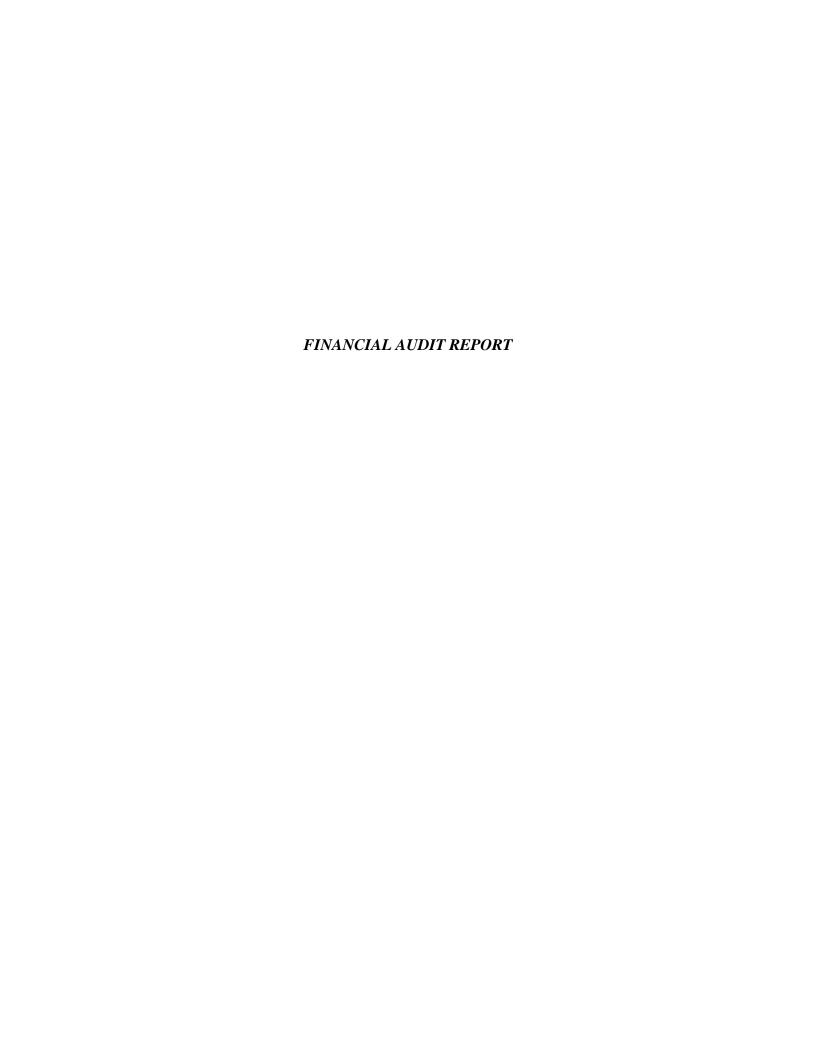

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities and the discretely presented component unit of Pearl River Community College as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the College's basic financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. The financial statements of Pearl River Community College Development Foundation, Inc. were not audited in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the Auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Unmodified Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities and the discretely presented component unit of Pearl River Community College, as of June 30, 2020, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows for the year ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the *Management's Discussion and Analysis*, the Schedule of the Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability, the Schedule of the College's Contributions-PERS, the Schedule of the College's Proportionate Share of the Net OPEB Liability, and the Schedule of the College's Contributions-OPEB be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise Pearl River Community College's basic financial statements. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

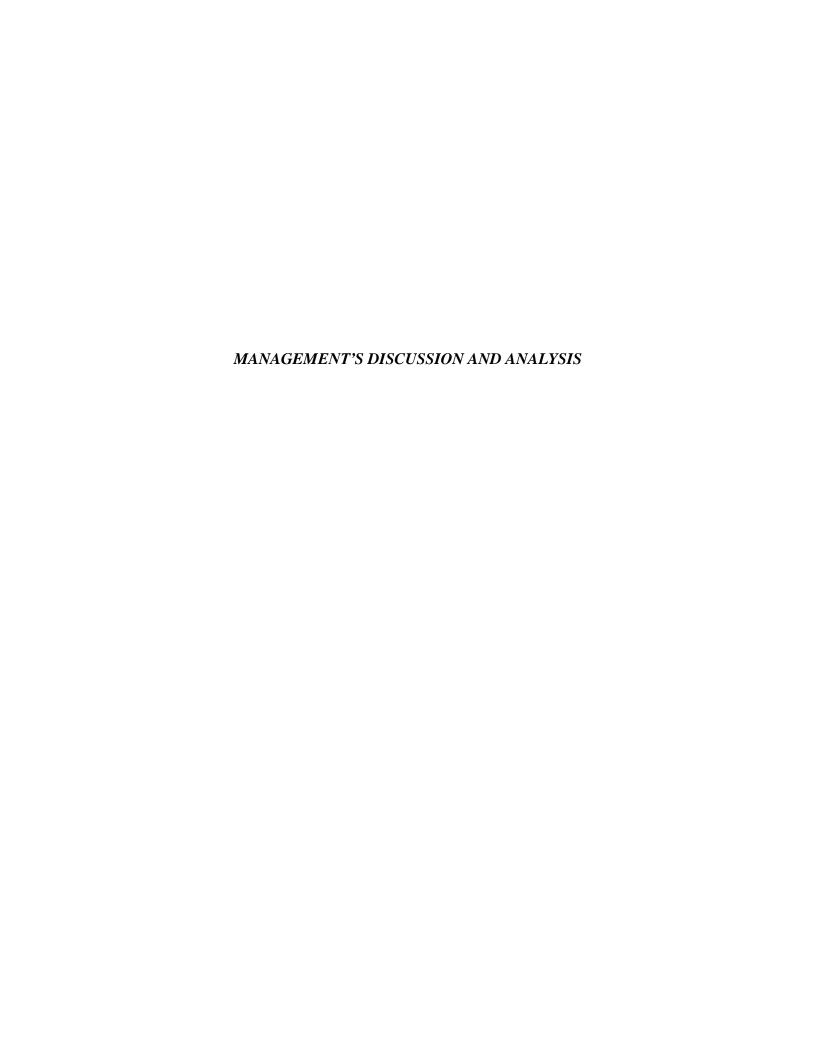

In our opinion, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 15, 2021, on our consideration of Pearl River Community College's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing on internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Pearl River Community College's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Pearl River Community College's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of the Pearl River Community College annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the financial performance of the College during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020. This discussion has been prepared by management along with the financial statements and related footnote disclosures and should be read in conjunction with and is qualified in its entirety by the financial statements and footnotes. The financial statements, footnotes, and this discussion are the responsibility of management.

Using the Annual Report

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements, prepared in accordance with the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 35, *Basic Financial Statements-and Management's Discussion and Analysis-for Public Colleges and Universities*.

One of the most important questions asked is whether the College as a whole is better or worse off because of the year's activities. The key to understanding this question is the Statement of Net Position, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and the Statement of Cash Flows. These Statements present financial information in a form similar to that used by corporations. It is prepared under the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenues and assets are recognized when the service is provided and expenses and liabilities are recognized when others provide the service, regardless of when cash is exchanged.

The Statement of Net Position includes all assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources. The College's net position (the difference between assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources) is one indicator of the College's financial health. Over time, increases or decreases in net position are one indicator of the improvement or erosion of the College's financial health when considered with non-financial facts such as enrollment levels and the condition of the facilities.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position presents the revenues earned and the expenses incurred during the year. Activities are reported as either operating or non-operating. The financial reporting model classifies State appropriations and gifts as non-operating revenues. The College's dependency on State aid and gifts results in an operating deficit. The utilization of long-lived assets, referred to as Capital Assets, is reflected in the financial statements as depreciation, which amortizes the cost of an asset over its expected useful life.

Another important factor to consider when evaluating financial viability is the College's ability to meet financial obligations as they mature. The Statement of Cash Flows presents information related to cash inflows and outflows summarized by operating, non-capital financing, capital and related financing, and investing activities.

Assets

Current Assets

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in the College's bank accounts, petty cash and certificates of deposit. The total amount of cash and cash equivalents reported as current assets on the College financial statements is \$26,676,958 at June 30, 2020, compared to the FY 2019 figure of \$24,379,920.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable relate to several transactions including county appropriations, accrued interest, student tuition and fee billings, and auxiliary enterprise sales such as food service and bookstore. In addition, receivables arise from grant awards and financial aid revenues. The receivables are shown net of allowance for doubtful accounts. The College receivables totaled \$4,434,212 at June 30, 2020, compared to \$5,238,085 for FY 2019.

Inventories

The College maintains inventories of resale merchandise as well as items for internal consumption. Books, student supplies, and institutional memorabilia make up the majority of the resale inventory. Inventories maintained for internal departmental use include paper goods. Inventories totaled \$384,473 at June 30, 2020, in comparison to \$316,311 for FY 2019.

Non-current Assets

Other Investments

Other long-term investments include bank certificates of deposit held by F.D.I.C. insured banks. The value at June 30, 2020 was \$0 and \$7,500 at June 30, 2019.

Capital Assets, Net

Capital assets, net, consist of land, infrastructure, buildings, equipment, and historical College holdings at June 30, 2020. The amount reported is net of accumulated depreciation. Capital assets, net totaled \$95,309,530 at June 30, 2020, in comparison to \$81,672,469 for FY 2019.

Deferred Outflows of Resources

The deferred outflows of resources are related to the pension and other postemployment benefits (OPEB). At June 30, 2020, the balance was \$7,261,195. The balance was \$5,941,321 at June 30, 2019.

Liabilities

Current Liabilities

Accounts Payable and Accrued Liabilities

Accounts payable and accrued liabilities represent amounts due at June 30, 2020 for goods and services received before the end of the fiscal year. The accounts payable and accrued liabilities totaled \$954,857 at June 30, 2020, in comparison to \$1,505,544 for FY 2019.

Long-Term Liabilities-Current Portion

Long-term liabilities-current portion, bonds and Net OPEB Liability-current portion represent the portion that would be payable by the end of the June 30, 2020 fiscal year. The amount of the current portion of debt at June 30, 2020 is \$1,325,408, compared to \$1,080,000 for FY 2019. The amount of the current portion of OPEB Liability at June 30, 2020 is \$107,849, compared to \$115,589 for FY 2019.

Non-current Liabilities

This liability consists of bonds payable and bond discounts and premiums. The total amount of the non-current portion of long-term liabilities is \$24,792,876 at June 30, 2020, compared to \$25,731,503 for FY 2019.

The net pension liability was \$53,552,605 at June 30, 2020 and \$48,705,996 at June 30, 2019.

The non-current portion of the OPEB Liability was \$2,775,891 at June 30, 2020 and \$2,473,674 at June 30, 2019.

Deferred Inflows of Resources

The deferred inflows of resources are related to the pension and the other postemployment benefits. The balance was \$240,096 at June 30, 2020 and \$1,168,220 at June 30, 2019.

Net Position

Net position represents the difference between the College's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources. Total net position at June 30, 2020 is \$56,009,044 compared to \$50,698,686 for FY 2019.

Analysis of Net Position

Restricted non-expendable net position consists of endowment gifts with specific restrictions on spending the principal given.

Restricted expendable net position consists of endowment gifts, gifts with specific restrictions, grants from third party agencies with expenditure restrictions, and loan funds.

Unrestricted net position represents those balances from operational activities that have not been restricted by parties external to the College such as donors or grant agencies. This includes funds that are normal working capital balances maintained for departmental and auxiliary enterprise activities.

Total operating loss for the fiscal year 2020 is \$(22,245,580) compared to \$(23,599,494) for FY 2019. Since the State of Mississippi appropriation is not included within operating revenue per GASB No. 35, the College will continue to show a significant operating loss.

The sources of operating revenue for the College are tuition and fees, grants and contracts, auxiliary services, and other operating revenues.

The College strives to provide students with the opportunity to obtain a quality education. Future enrollments at the College may be affected by a number of factors including any material increases in tuition and other mandatory charges stemming from any material decrease in appropriation funding from the State of Mississippi.

Total operating revenues for fiscal year 2020 are \$38,692,659, compared to \$33,384,521 for FY 2019. Tuition and fees are \$5,956,893, compared to \$4,850,366 for FY 2019. Operating expenses, including depreciation and amortization of \$3,283,235 totaled \$60,938,239. Of this total \$25,194,452 or 42% is for instruction. Operating expenses for FY 2019, including depreciation and amortization of \$3,390,888, totaled \$56,984,015. Of this total \$23,804,961, or 42%, was for instruction.

Revenues

Operating Revenues

Tuition and Fees

This category includes all tuition and fees assessed for educational purposes totaling \$5,956,893 for FY 2020, in comparison to \$4,850,366 for FY 2019.

Grants and Contracts

This includes all restricted revenues made available by government agencies as well as private agencies. Grant revenues are recorded only to the extent that the funds have been expended for exchange transactions. Nonexchange revenues are recorded when received or when eligibility criteria have been met.

Non-capital Gifts

This consists of gifts made to the College from a nongovernmental organization and/or individual. The cash gifts totaled \$1,289,614 at June 30, 2020, compared to \$924,989 for FY 2019.

Sales and Services from Educational Activities

Other operating revenues consist of income from educational activities that totaled \$142,892 for the 2020 fiscal year and \$159,638 for the 2019 fiscal year.

Sales and Services, Net

Sales and services, net, consist of various enterprise entities that exist predominantly to furnish goods and services to students, faculty, staff, or the general public and charge a fee directly related to the cost of those goods or services. They are intended to be self-supporting. Auxiliary enterprises primarily include the College bookstore.

Operating Expenses

Operating expenses for FY 2020 totaling \$60,938,239, include salaries and benefits of \$31,897,869 scholarships and fellowships of \$10,571,460, utilities of \$2,035,013, supplies of \$5,614,893, services of \$7,052,931, travel \$482,838, and depreciation and amortization of \$3,283,235. Operating expenses for FY 2019 totaling \$56,984,015, include salaries and benefits of \$30,823,217, scholarships and fellowships of \$6,857,568, utilities of \$2,102,445, supplies of \$5,406,065, services of \$7,777,020, travel \$626,812, and depreciation and amortization of \$3,390,888.

Non-operating Revenues (Expenses)

State Aid

The College's largest source of non-operating revenue is the State of Mississippi appropriation. The College received \$21,686,896 for 2019-2020 fiscal years, of which \$16,719,777 was for operations. In 2020, the College received \$4,967,119 in general obligation bonds of the State for capital improvements. During FY 2019, the College received \$15,462,791 which \$15,144,615 was for operations. The College received \$318,176 in general obligation bonds of the State for capital improvements for FY 2019.

County Appropriations

The College also receives revenue from the six county districts in which the school resides. The College uses the funding for salaries, benefits, and operational purposes. The College receives the appropriation in monthly payments, beginning in July of each year, since the fiscal year begins July 1st. The College received \$6,321,588 for the 2020 fiscal year from the counties and \$6,153,098 for FY 2019. This appropriation was fully recorded by the College during the fiscal year.

Investment Income, Net

This includes the interest income from the cash in the bank accounts. The investment income at June 30, 2020 was \$498,997, compared to the FY 2019 amount of \$545,184.

Other Non-operating Expenses

Total net other non-operating expenses amounted to \$(20,693) compared to FY 2019 in the amount of \$(0).

Statement of Cash Flows

Another way to assess the financial health of the College is to look at the Statement of Cash Flows. Its primary purpose is to provide relevant information about the cash receipts and cash payments of the College during a period. The Statement of Cash Flows also helps users assess:

- The ability to generate future net cash flows,
- The ability to meet obligations as they come due, and
- A need for external financing.

The major sources of funds for FY 2020 included in operating activities includes student tuition and fees \$5,257,354, auxiliary enterprises \$6,929,934, and grants and contracts \$26,065,140. The major uses of funds were payments made to employees \$(28,990,641), and to suppliers \$(13,607,968). During FY 2019, the major sources of funds included in operating activities include student tuition and fees \$17,484,999, auxiliary enterprises \$7,434,953, and grants and contracts \$19,249,066. The major uses of funds during FY 2019 were payments made to employees \$(27,025,135), and to suppliers \$(13,167,321).

The largest inflow of cash for FY 2020 in the non-capital financing activities group is the State appropriation of \$16,836,246. This figure compares to the FY 2019 amount of \$15,232,265.

Significant Capital Asset Transactions

During the 2020 fiscal year, \$(16,935,839) was paid for capital asset transactions. This figure compares to the fiscal year 2019 amount of \$(3,196,294).

Factors Impacting Future Periods

There are a number of issues of Community College-wide importance that directly impacted the fiscal year 2020 financial situation. The level of State support, compensation increases, student tuition and fee increases, and energy cost increases, impact the College's ability to expand programs, undertake new initiatives, and meet its core mission and ongoing operational needs.

State appropriations contribute approximately forty-four percent (44%) of general operations' revenue. The level of State support is therefore one of the key factors influencing the College's financial condition.

The need to continue to address priority needs and requirements for deferred maintenance, new technology, repairs, and new construction projects is a large challenge facing the College in the years to come

Various committees and individuals are assessing the College's performance toward identified goals and ways to achieve greater efficiencies and reduce expenditures in an effort to assist in meeting the future challenges.

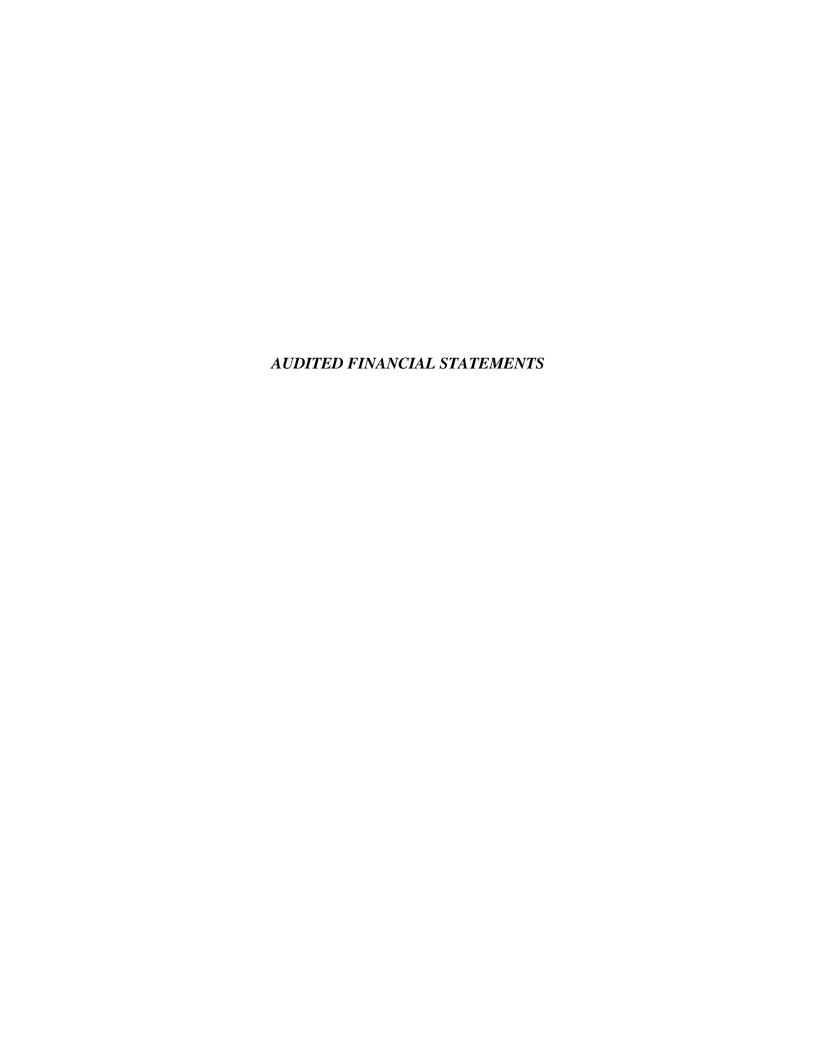

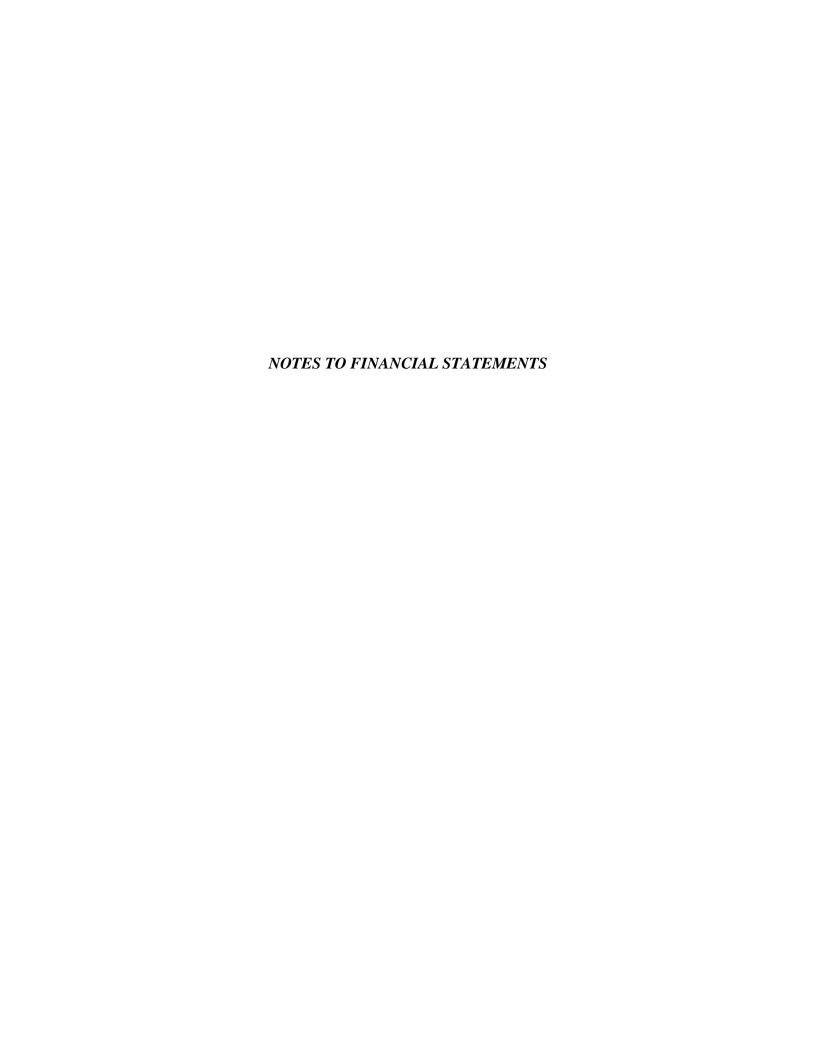

PEARL RIVER COMMUNITY COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2020

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity - Pearl River Community College was founded in 1924 and is one of Mississippi's fifteen (15) public community colleges. The legal authority for the establishment of Pearl River Community College is found in § 37-29-31, Miss. Code Ann. (1972).

Pearl River Community College is locally-governed by a sixteen-member Board of Trustees, selected by the Board of Supervisors of Forrest, Hancock, Jefferson Davis, Lamar, Marion, and Pearl River Counties who support the district through locally assessed Ad Valorem tax millage. One of the trustees from each of the supporting counties must be the County Superintendent of Education, unless the Superintendent chooses not to serve, in which case the county Board of Supervisors shall fill the vacancy in accordance with § 37-29-65, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Each board member is appointed for a five-year term. In addition, Pearl River Community College works jointly with the Mississippi State Board for Community and Junior Colleges, which coordinates the efforts of all 15 community colleges as they serve the taxpayers of the State of Mississippi.

Pearl River Community College reports the following discretely presented component unit:

Pearl River Community College Development Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) - The Foundation is a legally separate, tax-exempt nonprofit organization founded in 1987. The Foundation acts primarily as a fundraising organization to supplement the resources available to Pearl River Community College (College) in support of its programs.

Although the College does not control the timing or number of receipts from the Foundation, the majority of resources or income thereon that the Foundation holds and invests is restricted to the activities of the College by the donors.

During the year ended June 30, 2020, the Foundation distributed \$533,951 to the College. Of this amount, \$513,551 was for scholarships and \$20,400 was for salary reimbursement.

- B. Basis of Presentation The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Unites States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), including Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments, and Statement No. 35, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for Public College and Universities, issued in June and November 1999, respectively. The College now follows the "business-type activities" reporting requirements of GASB Statement No. 34 that provides a comprehensive one-line look at the College's financial activities.
- C. Basis of Accounting The financial statements of the College have been prepared on the accrual basis whereby all revenues are recorded when earned and all expenses are recorded when they have been reduced to a legal or contractual obligation to pay.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PAGE TWO YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2020

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

- D. Cash Equivalents For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, the College considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three (3) months or less to be cash equivalents.
- E. Short-term Investments Investments that are not cash equivalents but mature within the next fiscal year are classified as short-term investments.
- F. Accounts Receivable, Net Accounts receivable consists of tuition and fees charged to students, state appropriations, amounts due from state and federal grants and contracts, local governments and credits due to the College from vendors. Accounts receivable are recorded net of an allowance for doubtful accounts.
- G. Student Notes Receivable, Net Student notes receivable consists of federal, state and institutional loans made to students for the purpose of paying tuition and fee charges. Loan balances expected to be paid during the next fiscal year are presented on the Statement of Net Position as current assets. Those balances that are either in deferment status or expected to be paid back beyond the next fiscal year are presented as non-current assets on the Statement of Net Position.
- H. Inventories Inventories consist of the bookstore and printing supplies. These inventories are generally valued at the lower of cost or market, on either the first-in, first-out ("FIFO") basis or the average cost basis.
- I. Restricted Cash and Cash Equivalents Cash and cash equivalents that are externally restricted to make debt service payments, maintain sinking or reserve funds, or to purchase or construct capital or other noncurrent assets, are classified as restricted cash and cash equivalents on the Statement of Net Position.
- J. Endowment Investments Endowment investments are generally subject to the restrictions of donor gift instruments. They include true endowment funds, which are funds received from a donor with the restrictions that only the income is to be utilized.
- K. Capital Assets, Net of Accumulated Depreciation Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition, or, if donated, at fair market value at the date of donation. Renovations to buildings and improvements other than buildings that significantly increase the value or extend the useful life of the structure are capitalized. Routine repair and maintenance costs are charged to operating expense in the year in which the expense was incurred. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset and is not allocated to the functional expenditure categories. See Note 5 for additional details concerning useful lives, salvage values and capitalization thresholds. Expenditures for construction in progress are capitalized as incurred. Interest expense relating to construction is capitalized net of interest income earned on resources set aside for this purpose.
- L. Deferred Outflows of Resources In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to future periods and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The college has incurred deferred outflows that are related to pension reporting and to other postemployment benefits reporting.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PAGE THREE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2020

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

- M. Unearned Revenues Unearned revenues include amounts received for tuition and fees and certain auxiliary activities prior to the end of the fiscal year but related to the subsequent accounting period.

 Unearned revenues also include amounts received from grant and contract sponsors that have not yet been earned.
- N. Compensated Absences Twelve-month employees earn annual personal leave at a rate of eighteen (18) days per year for three (3) months to three (3) years of service, twenty-one (21) days per year for three (3) to eight (8) years of service, twenty-four (24) days per year for eight (8) to fifteen (15) years of service and twenty-seven (27) days per year for over fifteen (15) years of service. Personal leave accrual is also provided for eleven (11) month, ten (10) month, nine and one-half (9.5) month and nine (9) month employees. Part-time regular employees working twenty (20) hours or more per week shall accrue the same personal leave benefits as full-time employees on a pro rata basis as full-time employees with a comparable length of contract. Adjunct faculty do not accrue personal leave. There is no requirement that annual leave be taken and there is no maximum accumulation. Upon retirement from employment, each employee shall be paid for not more than thirty days of unused accumulated personal leave. This payment shall be made based on the remaining number of days (up to 30) after the employee has banked all applicable unused personal leave as creditable service for the purposes of the retirement system. The liability for accrued leave at June 30, 2020, as reported in the Statement of Net Position is \$2,605,744. The current portion cannot be reasonably estimated. Therefore, all liability for accrued leave is classified as long-term.
- O. Long-term Liabilities and Bond Discounts and Premiums In the proprietary financial statements, outstanding debt is reported as liabilities. Bond discounts or premiums and the difference between reacquisition price and the net carrying value of refunded debt are capitalized and amortized over the terms of the respective bonds using a method that approximates the effective interest method.
- P. Deferred Inflows of Resources This amount represents the College's proportionate share of the deferred inflows of resources reported by the pension plan and the other postemployment benefits in which the College participates. Deferred inflows of resources represent an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. See Notes 10 and 11 for additional details.
- Q. Pensions For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) and additions to/deductions from PERS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by PERS. For this purpose, the benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.
- R. Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions (OPEB) For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, and OPEB expense information about the fiduciary net position of the State and School Employees' Life and Health Plan (OPEB Plan) and additions to/deductions from the OPEB Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the OPEB Plan. For this purpose, benefit payments are recorded when the OPEB benefits become due. Investments are reported at fair value as determined by the State.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

S. Classification of Revenues - The College has classified its revenues as either operating or non-operating revenues according to the following criteria:

Operating revenues: Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions, such as (1) student tuition, net of scholarship discounts and allowances, (2) sales and services of auxiliary enterprises, net of scholarship discounts and allowances and (3) most federal, state and local grants and contracts.

Non-operating revenues: Non-operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of nonexchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other revenue sources that are defined as non-operating revenues by GASB Statement No. 9, *Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting* and GASB Statement No. 34, such as state appropriations, local appropriations and investment income.

- T. State Appropriations Pearl River Community College receives funds from the State of Mississippi based on a full-time equivalent formula, which is based on total credit hours generated by all students with special consideration given only to high-cost programs.
- U. Scholarship Discounts and Allowances Financial aid to students is reported in the financial statements under the alternative method as prescribed by the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO). Certain aid, such as loans, funds provided to students as awarded by third parties and Federal Direct Lending, is accounted for as a third-party payment (credited to the student's account as if the student made the payment). All other aid is reflected in the financial statements as operating expenses, or scholarship allowances, which reduce revenues. The amount reported as operating expenses represents the portion of aid that was provided to the student in the form of cash. Scholarship allowances represent the portion of aid provided to the student in the form of reduced tuition. Under the alternative method, these amounts are computed on a College basis by allocating the cash payments to students, excluding payments for services, on the ratio of total aid to the aid not considered to be third party aid.
- V. Net Position GASB Statement No. 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources and Net Position, reports equity as "Net Position" rather than "Net Assets". Net position is classified in three categories. Net Investment in capital assets is the portion of net position that consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of borrowings used to finance the purchase or construction of those assets. Restricted expendable net position is noncapital assets that must be used for a particular purpose as specified by creditors, grantors, or others. Unrestricted net position is the remaining net position less remaining noncapital liabilities which are not restricted-expendable.

The unrestricted net position balance of \$(24,059,807) at June 30, 2020, includes \$384,473 reserved for inventories and \$6,300,406 reserved for auxiliaries.

W. Accounting Standards - As required, the College has implemented GASB Statement No. 40, *Deposit and Investment Risk Disclosures - an amendment of GASB Statement No. 3*. This Statement addresses common deposit and investment risks related to credit risk, concentration of credit risk, interest rate risk, and foreign currency risk. Appropriate note disclosures have been incorporated to comply with the requirements of this standard.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PAGE FIVE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2020

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

X. Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions. This will affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

NOTE 2 - CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS AND INVESTMENTS

Policies:

A. The collateral for public entities' deposits in financial institutions are held in the name of the State Treasurer under a program established by the Mississippi State Legislature and is governed by §27-105-5, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Under this program, the College's funds are protected through a collateral pool administered by the State Treasurer. Financial institutions holding deposits of public funds must pledge securities as collateral against these deposits. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation.

The carrying amount of the College's deposits with financial institutions reported in the accompanying financial statements was \$35,879,005. The bank balance was \$38,109,561.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits

Custodial credit risk is defined as the risk that, in the event of a financial institution's failure, the College's deposits may not be returned to it. The College does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2020, the College's bank balance was not exposed to custodial credit risk.

B. Investments - Continued

Credit Risk – Investment policies are set forth by state statute. Investments are reported at fair value (market). The College does not have a formal investment policy that addresses credit risk. Section 37-59-43, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), authorizes the College to invest surplus funds in the types of investments authorized by Section 21-105-33(d) and (e), Miss Code Ann. (1972). This section permits the following types of investments: (a) certificates of deposits and interest-bearing accounts with qualified state depositories; (b) direct United States Treasury obligations; (c) United States Government agency, United States Government instrumentality or United States Government sponsored enterprise obligations, the principal and interest of which are fully guaranteed by the government or enumerated agency of the United States; (d) direct security repurchase agreements and reverse direct security repurchase agreements of any federal book entry of only those securities enumerated in (b) and (c) above; (e) direct obligations issued by the United States of America that are deemed to include securities of, or interest in, and open-end or closed-end any management type investment company or investment trust approved by the State Treasurer and the Executive Director of the Department of Finance and Administration.

Interest Rate Risk – The College does not have a formal investment policy that limits investments maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. Treasury securities are presented as investments with maturities of less than one year because they are redeemable in full immediately.

Custodial Credit Risk – For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the College will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At June 30, 2020, there is no custodial credit risk associated with any investments.

Concentration of Credit Risk – Disclosures of investments by amount and issuer for any issuer that represents five percent (5%) or more of total investments is required. This requirement does not apply to investments issued or explicitly guaranteed by the U.S. Government, investments in mutual funds and external investment pools, and other pooled investments. As of June 30, 2020, the College had the following investments that represent five percent (5%) or more of total investments:

NOTE 6 – NON-CURRENT LIABILITIES

Long-term liabilities of the College consist of bonds payable and certain other liabilities that are expected to be liquidated at least one (1) year from June 30, 2020. The College has the option to prepay all outstanding payments less any unearned interest to fully satisfy the obligation. There is also a fiscal funding addendum stating that if funds are not appropriated for periodic payment for any future fiscal period, the lessee will not be obligated to pay the remainder of the total payments due beyond the end of the current fiscal period.

NOTE 10 - PENSION PLAN OBLIGATIONS

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description

The College is a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System of Mississippi (PERS), a cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit pension plan as defined in GASB Statement Number 68, <u>Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions</u>. Membership in PERS is a condition of employment and is granted upon hiring for qualifying employees of the College. Code Section § 25-11-15, Mississippi Code Ann. (1972) grants the authority for general administration and proper operation of PERS to the PERS Board of Trustees (PERS Board). PERS issues a publicly available Comprehensive Annual Financial Report that can be obtained at www.pers.ms.gov.

Benefits Provided

For the cost-sharing plan, participating members who are vested and retire at or after age 60 or those who retire regardless of age with at least 30 years of creditable service (25 years of creditable service for employees who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011) are entitled upon application, to annual retirement allowance payable monthly for life in an amount equal to 2.00% of their average compensation for each year of creditable service up to and including 30 years (25 years for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011), plus 2.50% for each additional year of creditable service with an actuarial reduction in the benefit for each year of creditable service below 30 years or the number of years in age that the member is below 65, whichever is less. Average compensation is the average of the employee's earnings during the four highest compensated years of creditable service. A member may elect a reduced retirement allowance payable for life with the provision that, after death, a beneficiary receives benefits for life or for a specified number of years. Benefits vest upon completion of eight years of membership service (four years of membership service for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2007). PERS also provides certain death and disability benefits. In the event of death prior to retirement of any member whose spouse and/or children are not entitled to a retirement allowance, the deceased member's accumulated contributions and interest are paid to the designated beneficiary. Benefit provisions are established by Section § 25-11-1 et seq., Mississippi Code Ann. (1972) and may be amended only by the State Legislature.

A Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) payment is made to eligible retirees and beneficiaries. The COLA is equal to 3.00% of the annual retirement allowance for each full fiscal year of retirement up to the year in which the retired member reaches age 60 (55 for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011), with 3.00% compounded for each fiscal year thereafter.

Contributions

Per Chapter 11 of Title 25, Mississippi Code Ann. (1972), contribution requirements of plan members and their employers are established and may be amended only by the PERS Board. The adequacy of the rates is assessed annually by actuarial valuation. For the year ended June 30, 2020, member employees were required to contribute 9.00 percent of their annual pay, while the College's required contribution rate was 17.40 percent of annual covered payroll. The College's employer contributions to PERS for the years ending June 30, 2020, 2019, and 2018 were \$3,657,590, \$3,122,563, and \$2,945,225 (employer share). The contributions for the years met the required contributions.

<u>Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions</u>

At June 30, 2020, the Pearl River Community College reported a liability of \$53,552,605 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2019 and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The College's proportion of the net pension liability was based on employer contributions to PERS for the plan's fiscal year ended June 30, 2019, relative to the total employer contributions of participating employers to PERS. At June 30, 2020, the College's proportion was .304415%, which was .011587% more than its proportion measured as of June 30, 2019.

For the year ended June 30, 2020, the College, recognized pension expense of \$7,258,952. At June 30, 2020, the College reported deferred outflows or resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

Actuarial Assumptions

The total pension liability used in the June 30, 2019, actuarial valuation was determined by actuarial valuation prepared as of June 30, 2018. Subsequent to the June 30, 2018 valuation, the Board adopted new actuarial assumptions based on the experience investigation for the four-year period ending June 30, 2018. The following actuarial assumptions are applied to all periods included in the measurement:

Mortality rates were based on the PubS.H-2010(B) Retiree Table with the following adjustments: For males, 112% of male rates from ages 18 to 75 scaled down to 105% for ages 80 to 119. For females, 85% of the female rates from ages 18 to 65 scaled up to 102% for ages 75 to 119. Mortality rates will be projected generationally using the MP-2018 projection scale to account for future improvements in life expectancy.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a log-normal distribution analysis in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected nominal returns, net of pension plan investment expense and the assumed rate of inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation.

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.75%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employee contributions will be made at the current contribution rate (9.00%) and that participating employer contributions will be made at the current employer contribution rate (17.40%). Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

General Information about the OPEB Plan

Plan Description

State law mandates that all state, public education, library, junior and community college and retiring employees be offered health and life benefit coverage through the State and School Employees' Life and Health Insurance Plan (the Plan). The Plan was established by Section 25-15-3 et seq., Mississippi Code Ann. (1972), which may be amended only by the State Legislature. The State and School Employees' Health Insurance Management Board (the Board) administers the Plan. The Board has sole legal authority to promulgate rules and regulations governing the operations of the Plan within the confines of the law governing the Plan.

The Plan is self-insured and is financed through premiums collected from employers, employees, retirees and COBRA participants. The Plan provides for Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) as a multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB Plan. A trust was created June 28, 2018 for the OPEB Plan and, while no trust was in place for the June 30, 2019 Plan year-end, for the purposes of comparability for future periods, terminology used herein is based on the plan being a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB Plan. The Plan issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at http://knowyourbenefits.dfa.ms.gov/.

Benefits Provided

The Plan was formed by the State Legislature to provide group health and life benefits to full-time active and retired employees of the State, agencies, universities, community/junior colleges, public school districts and public libraries. In addition, the spouse and/or children of covered employees and retirees, as well as surviving spouses and COBRA participants, may be eligible for health insurance coverage under the Plan. Benefits of the OPEB Plan consist of an implicit rate subsidy, which is essentially the difference between the average cost of providing health care benefits to retirees under age 65 and the average cost of providing health care benefits to all participants when premiums paid by retirees are not age adjusted. Employees' premiums are funded primarily by their employers. Retirees must pay their own premiums, as do active employees for spouse and dependent medical coverage. The Board has the sole authority for setting life and health insurance premiums for the Plan. Per Section 12-15-15 (10) Mississippi Code Ann. (1972), a retired employee electing to purchase retiree life and health insurance must pay the full cost of such insurance premium. If the Board determined actuarially that the premium paid by the participating retirees adversely affects the overall cost of the Plan to the State, then the Board may impose a premium surcharge, not to exceed 15%, upon such participating retired employees who are under the age for Medicare eligibility and who were initially employed before January 1, 2006. For participating retired employees who are under the age for Medicare eligibility and who were initially employed on or after January 1, 2006, the Board may impose a premium surcharge in an amount the Board determined actuarially to cover the full cost of insurance. The Plan offers a Base option and a Select option for health benefits for non-Medicare participants. The Plan includes a separate coverage level for Medicare eligible retirees, Medicare eligible surviving spouses, and Medicare eligible dependents of retirees and surviving spouses.

Contributions

The Board has the sole authority for setting life and health insurance premiums for the Plan. The required premiums vary based on the Plan selected and the type of participant. Employers pay no premiums for retirees while employees' premiums are funded primarily by their employer. Contributions to the OPEB Plan from the College were \$107,849 for the year ended June 30, 2020.

OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources related to OPEB

At June 30, 2020, the College reported a liability of \$2,883,740 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB was measured as of June 30, 2019, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as that date. The basis for the College's proportion is determined by comparing the employer's average monthly employees participating in the Plan with the total average employees participating in the Plan in the fiscal year of all employers. The allocation was utilized because the level of premiums contributed by each employer is the same for any employee regardless of plan participation elections made by the employee. At the measurement date of June 30, 2019, the College's proportion was .33984688 percent. This was an increase of .00512217 percent from the proportionate share as of the measurement date of June 30, 2016.

For the year ended June 30, 2020, the College recognized OPEB expense of \$181,186. At June 30, 2020, the College reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB from the following sources:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total OPEB liability at June 30, 2019 was 3.50%. Since the Prior Measurement Date, the Discount Rate has changed from 3.89% to 3.50%.

The trust was established on June 28, 2018 with an initial contribution of \$1,000,000. As of June 30, 2019, the trust has \$1,017,904. The fiduciary net position is projected to be depleted immediately, therefore, the Municipal Bond Index Rate is used in the determination of the discount rate for both the June 30, 2018 and the June 30, 2019 total OPEB liability. The discount rate used to measure the total OPEB liability at June 30, 2019 was based on a monthly average of the Bond Buyers General Obligation 20-year Municipal Bond Index Rate.

NOTE 12 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The College is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees or students; and natural disasters. The College carries commercial insurance for these risks. Settled claims resulting from these insured risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

NOTE 13 - CONCENTRATIONS

The College receives a significant portion of its revenues from federal and state funded programs and grants. Future funding of these programs is necessary for the College to continue the current level of programs and courses offered.

NOTE 14 - CONTINGENCIES

Federal Grants – The College has received federal grants for specific purposes that are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Entitlements to those resources are generally conditional upon compliance with the terms and conditions of the grant agreements and applicable federal regulations, including the expenditure of resources for allowable purposes. Any disallowances resulting from the grantor audit may become a liability of the College.

The College is party to legal proceedings, many of which occur in the normal course of operations. It is not possible at the present time to estimate ultimate outcome or liability, if any, of the College with respect to the various proceedings. However, the College's legal counsel believes that the ultimate liability resulting from these lawsuits will not have a material adverse effect of the financial position of the College.

NOTE 15 - EFFECT OF DEFERRED AMOUNTS ON NET POSITION

The unrestricted net position amount of \$(24,059,807) includes the effect of deferred inflows/outflows of resources related to pensions and OPEB. A portion of the deferred outflow of resources related to pension in the amount of \$3,657,590 and OPEB in the amount of \$107,849 resulting from the College contributions subsequent to the measurement date, will be recognized as a reduction of the net pension liability and OPEB liability in the year ended June 30, 2021. The \$3,181,833 balance of the deferred outflow of resources related to pension at June 30, 2020, will be recognized in pension expense over the next four years. The \$313,923 balance of the deferred outflow of resources related to OPEB at June 30, 2020, will be recognized in expense over the next six years. The \$49,282 balance of the deferred inflow of resources related to pension at June 30, 2020, will be recognized in revenue over the next four years. The \$190,814 balance of deferred inflow of resources related to OPEB will be recognized in revenue over the next six years.

NOTE 16 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Events that occur after the Statement of Net Position date but before the financial statements are available to be issued must be evaluated for recognition or disclosure. The effects of subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that existed at the Statement of Net Position date are recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Subsequent events which provide evidence about conditions that existed after the Statement of Net Position date require disclosure in the accompanying notes. Management of the College evaluated the activity of the College through March 15, 2021 (the date the financial statements were available to be issued), and determined that the following subsequent events have occurred requiring disclosure in the notes to the financial statements:

In December 2019, a novel strain of coronavirus was reported to have surfaced in China. The spread of this virus has continued to cause some business disruption through reduced revenue. While this disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration. However, the related financial impact and duration cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

On August 11, 2020, the Board approved emergency purchases from the Cares Grant Program in the amount of \$1,581,610.

On September 8, 2020, the Board approved the relocation of the Poplarville bookstore to a more central location which currently houses the Marketing and Communications Department.

On October 13, 2020, the Board approved a local construction company bid of \$2,419,700 for Seal Hall renovations.

On November 10, 2020, the Board approved a local construction company bid for the Forrest County Center Pedestrian Commons in the amount of \$327,010.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Pearl River Community College Development Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit organization, was founded in 1987. The Foundation's mission is to raise funds in order to provide scholarships, faculty awards, teacher grants and endowments for the students and faculty of Pearl River Community College. Revenue is derived primarily from outside contributors.

The accounting policies of Pearl River Community College Development Foundation, Inc. conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America applicable to nonprofit organizations. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

The accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Under fund accounting, resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purpose. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds have been combined and presented for the Foundation as a whole in accordance with the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations".

Contributions - Contributions received are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Donations of property, equipment, marketable securities and other non-cash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation. Such donations are reported as net assets without donor restrictions unless the donor has restricted the donated assets to a specific purpose.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - For purposes of the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are considered to be all unrestricted highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less at the time of acquisition.

Investments - The Foundation has investments in certificates of deposit, which are short-term in nature and the fair market value approximates cost. The fair value of all the Foundation's investments in marketable securities are based upon quoted prices for these securities in active markets (Level 1 Measurements). Gains or losses on investments are reported in the statement of activities as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulations or by law.

Fair Value Measurements – Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value should be based on the assumptions market participants would use when pricing an asset. US GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes investments based on those assumptions. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets (observable inputs) and the lowest priority to an entity's assumptions (unobservable inputs). Pearl River Community Development Foundation groups assets at fair value in three levels, based on the markets in which the assets and liabilities are traded and the reliability of the assumptions used to determine fair value. These levels are:

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets as of the measurement date.
- Level 2 Other observable inputs, either directly or indirectly, including:
 - Quoted prices for similar assets/liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets in non-active markets;
 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset/liability; and,
 - Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by other observable market data.
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that cannot be corroborated by observable market data.

Income Taxes – The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Contributed Facilities - The Foundation occupies, without charge, certain premises located in Pearl River Community College owned buildings. The Foundation does not have a lease with the College for the office space and office furniture, which is for future benefits to be received from the Foundation. The College also provides other operating expenses, such as staff payroll and benefits, which have been shown on the Statement of Activities as both support and general administration expenses. The value of the office space, office furniture and utilities has not been included in the Statement of Activities because they cannot be reasonably determined.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Fixed Assets - The Foundation's fixed assets consist of computer equipment and office furniture. All assets are valued at cost and depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset. Office furniture and equipment are being depreciated over 5-7 years. Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred; major renewals and betterments are capitalized. When items of property or equipment are sold or retired, the related cost and accumulated depreciation is removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is included in the results of operations. Depreciation charged to expense in the current year totaled \$2,693. The fixed assets have a cost of \$107,660 and accumulated depreciation is \$53,230 at June 30, 2020.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions. This will affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Net Assets – Net assets, revenues, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor- or grantor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions. The governing board has designated, from net assets without donor restrictions, net assets for an operating reserve and board-designated endowment.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor – (or certain grantor-) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

NOTE 2 - AVAILABILITY AND LIQUIDITY - Continued

Pearl River Community College Development Foundation's goal is generally to maintain financial assets without restrictions to meet 90 days of operating expenses (approximately \$373,000).

NOTE 3 - FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTE 4 - FUNDRAISING

The Foundation conducts various fundraising events throughout the year. Fundraising revenue included under revenues in the Statement of Activities are for funds received from contributors related to a fundraising activity.

The fundraising expenses included under supporting services in the Statement of Activities are for expenses incurred in inducing others to contribute money for which the contributor will receive no direct economic benefit, such as printing, mailing and maintaining mailing lists.

NOTE 5 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Foundation receives a substantial amount of its support from Pearl River Community College. A significant reduction in the level of this support, if this were to occur, may have an effect on the Foundation's programs and activities.

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Foundation to credit risk include cash and investments.

Deposits are maintained at one financial institution. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) provides up to \$250,000 coverage at each institution. On June 30, 2020, \$388,327 of cash deposits were uninsured. Because the Foundation is classified as a private non-profit foundation, many financial institutions will not pledge securities for deposits in excess of FDIC coverage. However, management feels there is minimal risk exposure as a result of this uninsured balance.

The Foundation's investments are not collateralized. Future changes in market prices may make such investments less valuable.

NOTE 6 – INVESTMENTS

Interest Rate Risk – The Foundation does not have a formal investment policy that limits investments maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Custodial Credit Risk – For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the Foundation will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are that are in the possession of an outside party. At June 30, 2020, there is no custodial credit risk associated with any investments.

Concentration of Credit Risk – Disclosure of investments by amounts and issuer for any issuer that represents five percent or more of total investments is required. This requirement does not apply to investments issued or explicitly guaranteed by the U.S. Government, investments in mutual funds and external investment pools, and other pooled investments. As of June 30, 2020, the Foundation did not have any investments to which this would apply.

Investments are stated at fair value, which is the amount at which an investment could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties. Fair values are based on quoted market prices. At June 30, 2020, fair value exceeded costs by \$529,275. Interest and investment income for the year ended June 30, 2020, consisted of interest income of \$220,713, realized losses of \$74,051, and unrealized losses of \$387,656.

Level 1 Inputs

The Foundation categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure fair value of the asset. All investments are measured using Level 1 inputs, which are quoted market prices for identical assets traded in active markets.

<u>Investment Policy</u> - The endowment's purpose is to enhance the educational mission of Pearl River Community College by providing an option for private sector support and by increasing community awareness of the programs and services offered by the College.

<u>Interpretations of Relevant Law</u> – The Foundation's Board has interpreted the State of Mississippi Code of 1972, cited as the "Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act" (UMIFA) as requiring the Board to use reasonable care, skill and caution as exercised by a prudent investor, in considering the investment management and expenditures of endowment funds.

<u>Spending Policy</u> – The Foundation's spending policy is to allocate funds available for scholarships based on return on endowments at the time scholarships are to be awarded. The Foundation believes this method is appropriate to apply the most recent investment earnings of the investments and to maintain its long-term goals.

While this disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration. However, the related financial impact and duration cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

Neither the funds advanced to students nor the outstanding loan balance is included in the financial statements since the loans are made and subsequently collected by private lending institutions and/or the federal government.

A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies, and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. We did identify a certain deficiency in internal control, described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as 2020-001 that we consider to be a material weakness.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the College's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

College's Response to Finding

The College's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. The College's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. The Financial Aid Office has not reconciled the amount of private loans received to the student accounts for the year ended June 30, 2020. This results in an unidentifiable payable at year-end and lack of controls over receipts for private loans.

Criteria:

The College should reconcile private loans received to student accounts in a timely manner.

Condition:

The College did not reconcile student accounts in a timely manner.

Cause:

The College did not have internal controls in place to ensure timely reconciliation of student accounts.

Effect:

As a result of ineffective monitoring of compliance with reconciling student accounts, an error in a student's account was not timely detected and corrected.

Recommendation:

In order to properly record financial statement amounts and for proper internal control over receipts, the private loan amounts received should be reconciled to student accounts in a timely manner.

View of Responsible Officials:

At the conclusion of FY 2020, the College made significant changes in the Financial Aid Office staff, including management positions. Along with the changes in staffing, the College also embarked on the restructuring of the many financial aid processes to bring about critically needed automation to such processes in an effort to become more effective and efficient in the daily operations of the Financial Aid Office. Despite these challenges, the College has now positioned the Financial Aid Office to be successful in the management and the internal controls over receipts, enabling the reconciliation of loans to student accounts in a timely manner.
