Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of East Central Community College and East Central Community College Foundation, Inc., a discretely presented component unit of East Central Community College, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to financial statements, which collectively comprise the college's basic financial statements as listed in the contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. The financial statements of East Central Community College Foundation, Inc. were not audited in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditors consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities and the aggregate discretely presented component unit of East Central Community College as of June 30, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, the schedule of the college's proportionate share of the net pension liability - PERS, schedule of college contributions- PERS, schedule of the college's proportionate share of the net OPEB liability and schedule of college contributions - OPEB on pages 3 through 12, 50, 51, 52 and 53, respectively be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise East Central Community College's basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the accompanying supplementary information mentioned above is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 28, 2022, on our consideration of East Central Community College's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of East Central Community College's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering East Central Community College's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of the East Central Community College annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the financial performance of the College during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. This discussion has been prepared by management along with the financial statements and related footnote disclosures and should be read in conjunction with and is qualified in its entirety by the financial statements and footnotes. We have included in this discussion comparative data for 2020. The financial statements, footnotes, and this discussion are the responsibility of management.

Using the Annual Report

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements, prepared in accordance with the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 35, *Basic Financial Statements-and Management's Discussion and Analysis-for Public Colleges and Universities*. These financial statements differ significantly, in both form and the accounting principles used, from those presented prior to fiscal year 2003. The financial statements presented in prior years focused on the accountability of funds, while these statements focus on the financial condition of the College, the results of operations, and cash flows of the College as a whole.

The College is required to present the liability of the present value of projected benefit payments for defined benefit pension plans and the present value of projected OPEB payments as a liability on the College's financial statements. The College's net pension liability at June 30, 2021 was \$31,910,915 and the net OPEB liability was \$1,412,026.

One of the most important questions asked is whether the College's financial position has improved or deteriorated during the fiscal year. The key to understanding this question is the Statement of Net Position, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and the Statement of Cash Flows. These Statements present financial information in a form similar to that used by corporations. It is prepared under the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenues and assets are recognized when the service is provided and expenses and liabilities are recognized when others provide the service, regardless of when cash is exchanged.

The Statement of Net Position includes all assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. The College's Net Position (the difference between assets, deferred outflows of resources and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources) is one indicator of the College's financial health. Over time, increases or decreases in Net Position are one indicator of the improvement or erosion of the College's financial health when considered with non-financial facts such as enrollment levels and the condition of the facilities.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position presents the revenues earned and the expenses incurred during the year. Activities are reported as either operating or non-operating. The financial reporting model classifies state appropriations and gifts as non-operating revenues. The College's dependency on state aid and gifts results in an operating deficit. The utilization of long-lived assets, referred to as Capital Assets, is reflected in the financial statements as depreciation, which amortizes the cost of an asset over its expected useful life.

Another important factor to consider when evaluating financial viability is the College's ability to meet financial obligations as they mature. The Statement of Cash Flows presents information related to cash inflows and outflows summarized by operating, non-capital financing, capital and related financing, and investing activities.

<u>Assets</u>

Current Assets

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in the College's bank accounts. The total amount of cash and cash equivalents reported as current assets on the College financial statements was \$10,135,339 at June 30, 2021. This represents an increase of \$2,583,237 from the balance of \$7,552,102 on June 30, 2020.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable consists of several transactions including local appropriations, student tuition and fees and auxiliary services vendor credits. In addition, receivables arise from grant awards and financial aid revenues. The receivables are shown net of an allowance for doubtful accounts. The College's receivables totaled \$1,705,510 at June 30, 2021. This represents a decrease of \$790,008 from the balance of \$2,495,518 at June 30, 2020.

Inventories

The College maintains inventories of resale merchandise within the college bookstore. Books, student supplies, sportswear, gift items and institutional memorabilia make up the majority of the resale inventory. Inventories totaled \$333,670 at June 30, 2021. This represents an increase of \$62,229 from the balance of \$271,441 at June 30, 2020.

Non-Current Assets

Capital Assets, Net

Capital assets, net, consists of land, improvements, buildings, equipment, historical library holdings, construction in progress, and assets under capital lease at June 30, 2021. The amount reported is net of accumulated depreciation. Capital assets, net totaled \$36,877,225 at June 30, 2021. This represents an increase of \$860,939 from the balance of \$36,016,286 at June 30, 2020.

Liabilities

Current Liabilities

Accounts Payable and Accrued Liabilities

Accounts payable and accrued liabilities represent amounts due at June 30, 2021 for goods and services received before the end of the fiscal year. The accounts payable and accrued liabilities totaled \$1,628,489 at June 30, 2021. This represents an increase of \$565,914 from the balance of \$1,062,575 at June 30, 2020.

Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue represents revenue that was received by the College prior to the fiscal year end that has not been earned. The unearned revenue totaled \$145,858 at June 30, 2021. This represents an increase of \$118,566 from the balance of \$27,292 at June 30, 2020.

Long-Term Liabilities-Current Portion

Long-term liabilities-current portion represents the portion of long-term debt that will be paid during the 2021 fiscal year. The current portion of long-term debt was \$183,124 at June 30, 2021.

Non-Current Liabilities

Deposits

Deposits represents the deposits paid by students for reservation and possible damage to a dorm room for the future semester and also the deposits held for others such as individuals or organizations for which the college acts as custodian. The housing deposits are payable to the student upon check-out at the end of the semester. The custodial deposits are payable upon the request of the individual or organization. The amount of deposits totaled \$212,622 at June 30, 2021, an increase of \$7,689 compared to the balance of \$204,933 at June 30, 2020.

Accrued Leave

This liability consists of accrued compensated absence balances that represent the amount payable to employees for earned but unpaid vacation. The total amount of the non-current portion of accrued compensated balances on June 30, 2021 was \$274,870. This represents an increase of \$10,056 from the balance of \$264,814 at June 30, 2020.

Long-Term Liabilities

This liability consists of long-term debt for outstanding bonds, notes, and capital leases. The non-current portion of long-term debt totaled \$6,694,970 at June 30, 2021, which represents a decrease of \$183,123 compared to the balance of \$6,878,093 at June 30, 2020.

Changes Related to Implementation of GASB 68/75 (PERS and OPEB Liability)

The college is required to report their proportional share of the net pension liability associated with PERS and OPEB. This requirement significantly alters the financial position reported on the statement of net position. The college reported pension related deferred outflows of \$3,737,696 and OPEB related deferred outflows of \$309,910 at June 30, 2021. The college reported a net pension liability of \$31,910,915 and a net OPEB liability of \$1,412,026 at June 30, 2021. The net pension liability represents the college's proportionate share of the overall net pension liability of the PERS system as a whole. The net OPEB liability represents the college's proportionate share of the net OPEB liability related to group health insurance costs of the system as a whole. Pension related deferred inflows of \$1,003,801 and OPEB related deferred inflows of \$340,392 were reported at June 30, 2021.

Net Position

Net Position represents the difference between the College's assets and deferred outflows less liabilities and deferred inflows. Total Net Position at June 30, 2021 was \$10,246,332. This represents an increase of \$1,856,448 from the balance of \$8,389,884 on June 30, 2020, as reflected on the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position for fiscal year 2021.

Analysis of Net Position

Restricted expendable Net Position consists of unemployment funds, grants from third party agencies with expenditure restrictions, local appropriations restricted for capital projects and debt retirement.

The total operating loss for the fiscal year 2021 was \$(10,628,265), a decrease of \$1,567,755 from the loss for fiscal year 2020 of \$(12,196,020). Since the State of Mississippi appropriation is not included within operating revenue per GASB No. 35, beginning in fiscal year 2003 and forward, the College will show a significant operating loss.

The sources of operating revenue for the College are tuition and fees, grants and contracts, auxiliary services, and other operating revenues.

The College strives to provide students with the opportunity to obtain a quality education. Future enrollment at the College may be affected by a number of factors including any increases in tuition and other mandatory charges stemming from any decrease in appropriation funding from the State of Mississippi.

Total operating revenues for fiscal year 2021 were \$20,443,941. Tuition and fees were \$1,898,010. The tuition discount allocated to tuition and fees and auxiliary services was \$4,609,836 and \$490,071, respectively. Operating expenses, including depreciation of \$1,364,514 totaled \$31,072,206.

Revenues

Operating Revenues

Tuition and Fees

This category includes all tuition and fees assessed for educational purposes at a gross amount totaling \$6,507,846. The tuition discount allocated to tuition and fees for the 2021 fiscal year was \$4,609,836.

Grants and Contracts

This includes all restricted revenues made available by government agencies as well as private agencies. Grant revenues are recorded only to the extent that the funds have been expended for exchange transactions. Non-exchange revenues are recorded when received or when eligibility criteria have been met.

Sales and Services from Educational Activities

Other operating revenues consist of income from educational activities that totaled \$190,865 for the 2021 fiscal year. This represents a decrease of \$36,588 from the balance of \$227,453 for the 2020 fiscal year.

Sales and Services, Net

Auxiliary enterprises include the College bookstore, food services and housing.

Operating Expenses

Operating expenses totaled \$31,072,206. This includes salaries and benefits of \$15,521,448, utilities of \$876,025, supplies of \$3,328,868, contractual services of \$3,282,320, and depreciation of \$1,364,514.

Non-operating Revenues (Expenses)

State Appropriation

The College's largest source of non-operating revenue is the State of Mississippi appropriation. The College received \$9,092,436 for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. This represents a decrease of \$91,862 from the amount received for operations in the previous year. State appropriations for capital projects of \$1,123,650 were paid on behalf of the College during the 2021 fiscal year. During the previous year the college received \$370,894 of state appropriations for capital projects.

Local Appropriations

The College also receives revenue from Leake, Neshoba, Newton, Scott and Winston Counties. The College received \$3,269,791 for the 2021 fiscal year of which \$3,243,541 was for operating purposes. This represents an increase of \$148,997 from the previous year. The remaining \$26,250 was received in fiscal year 2021 for capital projects.

Investment Income. Net

This includes interest income earned on cash in the bank accounts and certificates of deposit. A total of \$37,478 was earned during the 2021 fiscal year.

Other Revenues

State Appropriations for Capital Purposes

The college received \$1,123,650 in revenue from the State of Mississippi to purchase, construct, renovate, or repair capital assets during the 2021 fiscal year.

Statement of Cash Flows

Another way to assess the financial health of the College is to look at the Statement of Cash Flows. Its primary purpose is to provide relevant information about the cash receipts and cash payments of the College during the reporting period. The Statement of Cash Flows also helps users assess:

- The ability to generate future net cash flows,
- The ability to meet obligations as they come due, and
- The need for external financing.

The major source of cash inflows included in operating activities for the 2021 fiscal year includes student tuition and fees, \$1,712,859, auxiliary enterprises, \$3,287,481 and grants and contracts, \$15,152,689. The major cash outflows of funds for the 2021 fiscal year were payments made to and for employees, \$14,721,437, scholarships and fellowships, \$6,520,142, service providers, \$857,366 and suppliers, \$6,271,321.

The largest inflow of cash in the non-capital financing activities group is the State appropriation of \$8,969,003.

Factors Impacting Future Periods

The College is heavily dependent on funding from the State of Mississippi. There are indications that State funding will remain level for the near future which would likely necessitate an increase in student tuition and fees. There is also the likelihood that the College will have to utilize some of the College's cash reserves for future construction and major facilities maintenance such as roof replacements. However, current cash reserves should allow for these items with no negative impact on the College's normal operations.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Financial Reporting Entity

East Central Community College was founded in 1928 and is one of Mississippi's 15 public community colleges. The legal authority for the establishment of East Central Community College is found in Section 37-29-31, Miss. Code Ann. (1972).

East Central Community College is governed by a 29-member board of trustees, selected by the boards of supervisors of Leake, Neshoba, Newton, Scott and Winston Counties who support the College through locally assessed ad valorem tax millage. One of the trustees from each of the supporting counties must be the county superintendent of education, unless the superintendent chooses not to serve, in which case the county board of supervisors shall fill the vacancy in accordance with Section 37-29-65, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Each board member is appointed for a 5-year term. In addition, East Central Community College works jointly with the Mississippi State Board for Community and Junior Colleges, which coordinates the efforts of all 15 community colleges as they serve the taxpayers of the State of Mississippi.

In accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 39, Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units, an Amendment to GASB Statement No. 14 East Central Community College reports the following discretely presented component unit:

East Central Community College Foundation – The Foundation is a legally separate, taxexempt nonprofit organization under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation acts primarily as a fund raising organization to supplement the resources available to East Central Community College in support of its programs.

Although the college does not control the timing or amount of receipts from the Foundation, the majority of resources that the Foundation holds and invests are restricted to support the activities of the College.

During the year ended June 30, 2021, the Foundation distributed \$161,437 in scholarships, \$1,037 in books and \$10,994 in equipment, supplies and services to the college. Significant note disclosures applicable to the Foundation's financial statements are presented at the end of the College's notes to financial statements.

b. Basis of Presentation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), including Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements — and Management's Discussion and Analysis — for State and Local Governments, and Statement No. 35, Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis of Public College and Universities, issued in June and November, 1999, respectively. The college now follows the "business-type activities" reporting requirements of GASB Statement No. 34 that provides a comprehensive look at the college's financial activities.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

c. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The basic financial statements of the college have been prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting whereby all revenues are recorded when earned and all expenses are recorded when they have been reduced to a legal or contractual obligation to pay, which is in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Federal grants and assistance awards made on the basis of entitlement periods are recorded as receivables and revenues when entitlement occurs. Federal reimbursement type grants are recorded as revenues when the related expenditures are recognized. Use of grant resources is conditioned upon compliance with terms of the grant agreements and applicable federal regulations, which include subjecting grants to financial and compliance audits.

Property taxes, intergovernmental revenues (shared revenues, grants and reimbursements from other governments) and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from non-operating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the College are charges to students for tuition sales and services and grants and contracts. Operating expenses for Enterprise Funds include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation of capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

d. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The College's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition. The College deposits excess funds in the financial institutions selected by the Board of Trustees. State statutes specify how these depositories are to be selected.

e. Short-term Investments

Investments that are not cash equivalents but mature within the next fiscal year are classified as short-term investments. The College can invest its excess funds, as permitted by Section 29-3-113, Miss. Code Ann (1972), in interest-bearing deposits or other obligations of the types described in Section 27-105-33, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), or in any other type investment in which any other agency, instrumentality or subdivision of the State of Mississippi may invest, except that 100 percent of said funds are authorized to be so invested.

For accounting purposes, certificates of deposit are classified as investments if they have an original maturity greater than three months when acquired.

f. Accounts Receivables, Net

Accounts receivables consist of tuition and fees charged to students, state appropriations, amounts due from state and federal grants and contracts, local governments and credits due to the college from vendors. Accounts receivables are recorded net of an allowance for doubtful accounts, which is based on historical losses and an analysis of currently outstanding amounts.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

g. Student Notes Receivables, Net

Student notes receivables consist of federal, state and institutional loans made to students for the purpose of paying tuition and fee charges. Loan balances expected to be paid during the next fiscal year are presented on the statement of Net Position as current assets. Those balances that are either in deferment status or expected to be paid back beyond the next fiscal year are presented as noncurrent assets on the Statement of Net Position.

h. Inventories and Prepaid Expenses

Inventories consist of bookstore, physical plant and printing supplies. These inventories are valued at the lower of cost or market, on the first-in, first-out ("FIFO") basis. Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in the financial statements.

i. Restricted Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents that are externally restricted to make debt service payments, maintain sinking or reserve funds, or to purchase or construct capital or other noncurrent assets, are classified as restricted cash and cash equivalents on the Statement of Net Position.

j. Capital Assets, Net of Accumulated Depreciation

Capital assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition, or, if donated, at fair market value at the date of donation. Renovations to buildings and improvements other than buildings that significantly increase the value or extend the useful life of the structure are capitalized. Routine repairs and maintenance costs are charged to operating expense in the year in which the expense was incurred. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset and is not allocated to the functional expenditure categories. See Note 5 for additional details concerning useful lives, salvage values and capitalization thresholds. Expenditures for construction in progress are capitalized as incurred. Interest expense relating to construction is capitalized net of interest income earned on resources set aside for this purpose.

k. Unearned Revenues

Unearned revenues include amounts received for tuition and fees and certain auxiliary activities prior to the end of the fiscal year but related to the subsequent accounting period. Unearned revenues also include amounts received from grant and contract sponsors that have not yet been earned.

I. Deferred outflows/inflows of resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

See Note 13 for further details.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

m. Compensated Absences

Twelve-month employees earn annual personal leave at a rate of 10 days per year. There is no requirement that annual leave be taken and there is no maximum accumulation. At termination, these employees are paid for up to 30 days of accrued leave. The liability for accrued leave at June 30, 2021, is reported in the Statement of Net Position as a long-term liability in the amount of \$274,870. See Note 6 for additional details.

n. Classification of Revenues

The college has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

- Operating revenues: Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of
 exchange transactions, such as (1) student tuition, net of scholarship discounts and
 allowances, (2) sales and services of auxiliary enterprises, net of scholarship discounts
 and allowances and most federal, state and local grants and contracts.
- Nonoperating revenues: Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the
 characteristics of nonexchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other
 revenue sources that are defined as nonoperating revenues by GASB Statement No. 9,
 Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental
 Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting and GASB Statement No. 34, such as state
 appropriations, local appropriations and investment income.

o. State Appropriations

East Central Community College receives funds from the State of Mississippi based on the number of full-time students actually enrolled and in attendance on the last day of the sixth week of the fall semester of the previous year, counting only those students who reside within the State of Mississippi. This formula is based entirely on full-time equivalent calculations.

p. Local Appropriations

East Central Community College receives funds from ad valorem taxes levied by the counties within the College's levying district for general support, maintenance, and capital improvements. Ad Valorem taxes are levied by the governing authority of each applicable county within the College's levying district. East Central Community College's levying district includes Leake, Neshoba, Newton, Scott and Winston Counties.

q. Scholarship Discounts and Allowances

Financial aid to students is reported in the financial statements under the alternative method as prescribed by the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO). Certain aid, such as loans, funds provided to students as awarded by third parties and federal direct lending, is accounted for as a third party payment (credited to the student's account as if the student made the payment). All other aid is reflected in the financial statements as operating expenses, or scholarship allowances, which reduce revenues. The amount reported as operating expenses represents the portion of aid that was provided to the student in the form of cash. Scholarship allowances represent the portion of aid provided to the student in the form of reduced tuition. Under the alternative method, these amounts are computed on a college basis by allocating the cash payments to students, excluding payments for services, on the ratio of total aid not considered to be third party aid.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

r. Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) and additions to/deductions from PERS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by PERS. For this purpose, the benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

s. Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions (OPEB)

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the State and School Employees' Life and Health Plan (OPEB Plan) and additions to/deductions from the OPEB Plan's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the OPEB Plan. For this purpose, benefit payments are recorded when the OPEB benefit come due. Investments are reported at fair value as determined by the state.

t. Net Position

GASB Statement No. 63, Financial Reporting of Unearned Outflows of Resources, Unearned Inflows of Resources and Net Position, reports equity as "Net Position" rather than "Net Assets". Net position is classified in three categories:

- a. Net investment in capital assets is the portion of net position that consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of borrowings used to finance the purchase or construction of those assets.
- b. Restricted expendable net position is noncapital assets (net of related liabilities) that must be used for a particular purpose as specified by creditors, grantors, or donors.
- c. Unrestricted net position is the remaining net position not restricted for any particular purpose.

The unrestricted net position balance of \$(21,811,490) at June 30, 2021, includes \$4,119,078 in an unrestricted auxiliary fund.

u. Accounting Standards Update

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board issued GASB 95, *Postponement of the Effective Dates of Certain Authoritative Guidance* in May 2020. The objective of this Statement was to provide temporary relief to governments in light of the COVID-19 pandemic by postponing effective dates of certain Statements and Implementation Guides. The effective dates of GASB 83-84, GASB 88-93, and Implementation Guides No. 2017-3, 2018-1, 2019-1, and 2019-2 were postponed one year. The effective dates of GASB 87, *Leases*, and Implementation Guide No. 2019-3, *Leases*, were postponed eighteen months.

Note 2 – Cash and Cash Equivalents

Investment policies as set forth by policy and state statute authorize the college to invest in demand deposits and interest-bearing time deposits such as savings accounts, certificates of deposit, money market funds, U.S. Treasury bills and notes, and repurchase agreements. For the year ended June 30, 2021, the College had \$10,834,069 in cash and cash equivalents.

Deposits. The collateral for public entities' deposits in financial institutions is held in the name of the State Treasurer under a program established by the Mississippi State Legislature and is governed by Section 27-105-5, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). Under this program, the college's funds are protected through a collateral pool administered by the State Treasurer. Financial institutions holding deposits of public funds must pledge securities as collateral against these deposits. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits. Custodial credit risk is defined as the risk that, in the event of the failure of a financial institution, the College will not be able to recover deposits of collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The College does not have a formal policy for custodial credit risk. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Deposits above FDIC coverage are collateralized by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the name of the Mississippi State Treasurer on behalf of the College.

Note 9 - Defined Benefit Pension Plan

General Information about the Pension Plan:

Plan Description. The College contributes to the Public Employees' Retirement System of Mississippi (PERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan. PERS provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Plan provisions and the Board of Trustees' authority to determine contribution rates are established by Miss. Code Ann. Section 25-11-1 et seq., (1972, as amended) and may be amended only by the Mississippi Legislature. PERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report is available at www.pers.ms.gov.

Benefits provided. Membership in PERS is a condition of employment granted upon hiring for qualifying employees and officials of the State of Mississippi, state universities, community and junior colleges, and teachers and employees of the public colleges. For those persons employed by political subdivisions and instrumentalities of the State of Mississippi, membership is contingent upon approval of the entity's participation in PERS by the PERS' Board of Trustees. If approved, membership for the entity's employees is a condition of employment and eligibility is granted to those who qualify upon hiring. Participating members who are vested and retire at or after age 60 or those who retire regardless of age with at least 30 years of creditable service (25 years of creditable service for employees who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011) are entitled, upon application, to an annual retirement allowance payable monthly for life in an amount equal to 2.0 percent of their average compensation for each year of creditable service up to and including 30 years (25 years for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011), plus 2.5 percent for each additional year of creditable service with an actuarial reduction in the benefit for each year of creditable service below 30 years or the number of years in age that the member is below 65, whichever is less. Average compensation is the average of the employee's earnings during the four highest compensated years of creditable service. Benefits vest upon completion of eight years of membership service (four years of membership service for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2007). PERS also provides certain death and disability benefits. A Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) payment is made to eligible retirees and beneficiaries. The COLA is equal to 3.0 percent of the annual retirement allowance for each full fiscal year of retirement up to the year in which the retired member reaches age 60 (55 for those who became members of PERS before July 1, 2011), with 3.0 percent compounded for each fiscal year thereafter.

Note 9 - Defined Benefit Pension Plan (Continued)

Contributions. PERS members are required to contribute 9.00% of their annual covered salary, and the College is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The employer's rate as of June 30, 2021 was 17.40% of annual covered payroll. Plan provisions and the Board of Trustees' Authority to determine contribution rates are established by Section 25-11-1 of the Mississippi 'Code of 1972, as amended, and may be amended only by the State of Mississippi Legislature. The contribution requirements of PERS members and employers are established and may be amended only by the State of Mississippi Legislature. The College's contributions to PERS for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2021, 2020 and 2019 were \$1,896,943, \$1,909,860, and \$1,738,657, respectively, which equaled the required contributions for each year.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At June 30, 2021, the college reported a liability of \$31,910,915 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2020, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The College's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the College's long-term share of contribution to the pension plan relative to projected contributions of all participating entities, actuarially determined. The College's proportionate share used to calculate the June 30, 2021 net pension liability was .164839 percent, which was based on a measurement date of June 30, 2020. This was a decrease of .0046610 percent from its proportionate share used to calculate the June 30, 2020 net pension liability, which was based on a measurement date of June 30, 2019.

For the year ended June 30, 2021, the College recognized pension expense of \$2,497,859. At June 30, 2021 the College reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

For females, 85% of the female rates from ages 18 to 65 scaled up to 102% for ages 75 to 119. Mortality rates will be projected generationally using the MP-2018 projection scale to account for future improvements in life expectancy.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a log-normal distribution analysis in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected nominal returns, net of pension plan investment expense and the assumed rate of inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. The most recent target asset allocation and best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class are summarized in the following table:

Discount rate. The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.75 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate (9.00%) and that employer contributions will be made at the current contribution rate (17.40%) thereafter. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Note 10 – Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

General Information about the OPEB Plan.

Plan description. State law mandates that all state, public education, library, junior and community college and retiring employees be offered health and life benefit coverage through the State and School Employees' Life and Health Insurance Plan (the Plan). The Plan was established by Section 25-15-3 et seq., Mississippi Code Ann. (1972), which may be amended only by the State Legislature. The State and School Employees' Health Insurance Management Board (the Board) administers the Plan. The Board has the sole legal authority to promulgate rules and regulations governing the operations of the Plan within the confines of the law governing the Plan. The Plan is self-insured and is financed through premiums collected from employers, employees, retirees and COBRA participants. The Plan provides for Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) as a multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plan. The plan issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at http://knowyourbenefits.dfa.ms.gov/.

Benefits provided.

The Plan was formed by the State Legislature to provide group health and life benefits to full-time active and retired employees of the State, agencies, universities, community/junior colleges, public school districts and public libraries. In addition, the spouse and/or children of covered employees and retirees, as well as surviving spouses and COBRA participants, may be eligible for health insurance coverage under the Plan. Benefits of the OPEB Plan consist of an implicit rate subsidy, which is essentially the difference between the average cost of providing health care benefits to retirees under age 65 and the average cost of providing health care benefits to all participants when premiums paid by retirees are not age adjusted. Employees' premiums are funded primarily by their employers. Retirees must pay their own premiums, as do active employees for spouse and dependent medical coverage. The Board has the sole authority for setting life and health insurance premiums for the Plan. Per Section 12-15-15 (10) Mississippi Code Ann. (1972), a retired employee electing to purchase retiree life and health insurance must pay the full cost of such insurance premium.

Note 10 – Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) (Continued)

Benefits provided.(Continued)

If the Board determined actuarially that the premium paid by the participating retirees adversely affects the overall cost of the Plan to the State, then the Board may impose a premium surcharge, not to exceed 15%, upon such participating retired employees who are under the age for Medicare eligibility and who are initially employed before January 1, 2006. For participating retired employees who are under the age for Medicare eligibility and who are initially employed on or after January 1, 2006, the Board may impose a premium surcharge in an amount the Board determined actuarially to cover the full cost of insurance. The Plan offers a Base option and a Select option for health benefits for non-Medicare participants. The Plan includes a separate coverage level for Medicare eligible retirees, Medicare Eligible surviving spouses, and Medicare eligible dependents of retirees and surviving spouses.

Contributions.

The Board has the sole authority for setting life and health insurance premiums for the Plan. The required premiums vary based on the plan selected and the type of participant. Employers pay no premiums for retirees while employees' premiums are funded primarily by their employer. Contributions to the OPEB plan from the College were \$48,840 for the year ended June 30, 2021.

OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources related to OPEB

At June 30, 2021, the College reported a liability of \$1,412,026 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability was measured as of June 30, 2020, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The basis for the College's proportion is determined by comparing the employer's average monthly employees participating in the Plan with the total average employees participating in the Plan in the fiscal year of all employers. The allocation was utilized because the level of premiums contributed by each employer is the same for any employee regardless of plan participation elections made by the employee. At the measurement date of June 30, 2020, the College's proportion was .18144585 percent. This was an increase of .00007605 percent from the proportionate share as of the measurement date of June 30, 2019.

For the year ended June 30, 2021, the College recognized OPEB expense of \$27,992. At June 30, 2021, the College reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB from the following sources:

Discount rate. The discount rate used to measure the total OPEB liability at June 30, 2020 was 2.19 percent. Since the Prior Measurement Date, the Discount Rate has changed from 3.50% to 2.19%.

The trust was established on June 28, 2018 with an initial contribution of \$1,000,000. As of June 30, 2020, the trust has \$1,037,371. The fiduciary net position is projected to be depleted immediately, therefore, the Municipal Bond Index Rate is used in the determination of the discount rate for both the June 30, 2019 and the June 30, 2020 total OPEB liability. The discount rate used to measure the total OPEB liability at June 30, 2020 was based on a monthly average of the Bond Buyers General Obligation 20-year Municipal Bond Index Rate.

Note 11 - Contingencies

Federal Grants- the College has received federal grants for specific purposes that are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Entitlements to these resources are generally conditional upon compliance with the terms and conditions of the grant agreements and applicable federal regulations, including the expenditure of resources for allowable purposes. Any disallowances resulting from the grantor audit may become a liability of the College.

COVID 19 – On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 virus outbreak to be a pandemic. Management has evaluated the potential impact of the pandemic on the College's operations. As of September 28, 2022, Management has noted an adverse effect on workforce availability and operational costs. The long term effects of these items on the net position of the College cannot be determined as of the date of this report.

Note 12 - Risk Management

The college is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions, injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The college carries commercial insurance for these risks. Settled claims resulting from these insured risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Note 13 - Effect of Deferred Amounts on Net Position

The unrestricted net position amount of \$(21,811,490) includes the effect of deferring the recognition of expenses resulting from a deferred outflow from pensions. The total deferred outflows from pensions is \$3,737,696 at June 30, 2021. \$1,840,753 of the balance of the deferred outflow of resources at June 30, 2021 will be recognized as expenses and decrease unrestricted net position over the next 3 years. The remaining balance of \$1,896,943 in deferred outflows represents contributions made by the college into PERS after the measurement date and will be recognized as a reduction in the net pension liability in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022.

The unrestricted net position amount of \$(21,811,490) includes the effect of deferring the recognition of expenses resulting from deferred outflow from OPEB. The total deferred outflows from OPEB is \$309,910 at June 30, 2021. \$261,070 of the balance of the deferred outflow of resources at June 30, 2021 will be recognized as expenses and decrease unrestricted net position over the next 5 years. The remaining balance of \$48,840 in deferred outflows represents contributions made by the college into the OPEB plan after the measurement date and will be recognized as a reduction in the net OPEB liability in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022.

The unrestricted net position amount of \$(21,811,490) includes the effect of deferring the recognition of revenue resulting from deferred inflow from pensions. The \$1,003,801 balance of the deferred inflow of resources at June 30, 2021 will be recognized as revenue and increase unrestricted net position over the next 4 years.

The unrestricted net position amount of \$(21,811,490) includes the effect of deferring the recognition of revenue resulting from deferred inflow from OPEB. The \$340,392 balance of the deferred inflow of resources at June 30, 2021 will be recognized as revenue and increase unrestricted net position over the next 5 years.

The college has entered into a Vocational Educational Agreement dated August 17, 1982 creating the Philadelphia-Neshoba Vocational-Technical Center. This consortium was created pursuant to the provisions of Section 37-31-73, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and approved by the Mississippi Department of Education. The consortium includes the Neshoba County School District, Philadelphia Public School District and East Central Community College.

Section 37-31-73, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), authorizes the above noted entities to enter into an agreement that would provide for the construction or operation of a regional vocational education center. Any such agreement should provide for a designated fiscal agent, providing the method of financing the construction and operation of such facilities, the manner in which such facilities are to be controlled and staffed and detail procedures for student admission and transportation services for those students.

East Central Community College has been designated as the fiscal agent for the Philadelphia-Neshoba Vocational-Technical Center, and the operations of the consortium are included in its financial statements.

The following Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances is presented to detail the financial activity of the Philadelphia-Neshoba Vocational-Technical Center.

Note 16 - Subsequent Events

Events that occur after the statement of Net Position date but before the financial statements are available to be issued must be evaluated for recognition of financial statement disclosure. The effects of subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that existed at the statement of Net Position date are recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Subsequent events which provide evidence about conditions that existed after the statement of Net Position date require disclosure in the accompanying notes. Management of East Central Community College evaluated the activity of the College through September 28, 2022, and determined that there were no subsequent events which would require disclosure in the notes to financial statements.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies.

A. Description of Business Activities

The East Central Community College Foundation, Inc. is a nonprofit organization organized for the purpose of assisting individuals in pursuing their collegiate education and training by providing scholarships and awards to individuals on the basis of academic achievement and need. East Central Community College Foundation, Inc. provides leadership in attracting private investment to East Central Community College. The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax in accordance with Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

B. Form of Governance

The foundation is governed by a fourteen member board at this time. The President of the college and the President of the Board of Trustees serve on the board. The Vice President of the Business Operations of the college also serves on the board. All board members are appointed to the board by current foundation board members. The By-Laws of the foundation state that the board can have no more than thirty members. Board members serve on the board for an indefinite time period.

C. Reporting Entity

For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation is considered to be a component unit of East Central Community College.

D. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The financial statements have been prepared to present balances and transactions according to the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions – net assets that represent resources generated from operations or that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Net assets without donor restrictions include contributions designated to a particular program or unit for which the use or purpose is unrestricted.

Net assets with donor restrictions – net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by actions of the Foundation and or the passage of time. Net assets in this class include unconditional gifts for restricted purposes and donor-restricted endowment funds.

Generally, the donor of these assets permits the Foundation to use all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes in support of the College.

Revenues are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenditures are reported as decreases in net assets without donor restrictions. Gains and losses on investments and other assets or liabilities are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulations or by law. Expirations of restrictions on net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued).

D. Basis of Accounting (Continued)

Contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as revenues in the period received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value. Contributions to be received after one year are discounted at a rate commensurate with the risk involved. Amortization of the discount is recorded as contribution revenue and recognized in accordance with donor-imposed restrictions, if any, on the contributions. Allowance is made for uncollectible contributions based upon management's judgment and analysis of the creditworthiness of the donors, past collection experience and other relevant factors.

Income and realized and unrealized gains (losses) on investments of net assets with donor restrictions are reported as follows:

- As increases (decreases) in net assets with donor restrictions if the terms of the gift or the Foundation's interpretation of relevant state law require that they be added to the principal of a permanent endowment fund, or in temporarily restricted net assets if the terms of the gift impose restrictions on their use;
- As increases (decreases) net assets without donor restrictions in all other cases.

E. Revenue Recognition

Contributions received are recorded as without donor restriction or with donor restriction support depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. When a stipulated time restriction ends or when a purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with restrictions are reclassified to net assets without restrictions and are reported in the Statement of Activities as "net assets released from restrictions."

F. Public Support and Revenue

Monthly and annual contributions are generally available for unrestricted use in the current year unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give due in the next year are reflected as current promises to give and are recorded at their net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give due in subsequent years are reflected as long term promises to give and are recorded at net present value of their net realizable value applicable to the years in which the promises are received to discount the amounts.

Endowment contributions and investments are permanently restricted by the donor. Investments earnings available for distribution are recorded in net assets without donor restrictions. Investment earnings with donor restrictions are recorded in net assets with donor restrictions based on the nature of the restrictions.

Contributions of cash and other assets are reported as support with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets.

Contributions of property, equipment, marketable securities and other non-cash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values in the period received. Such contributions are reported as without donor restricted support unless the donor has restricted the donated assets to a specific purpose.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued).

G. Donated Assets

Donated assets are recorded at fair market value at the date of gift.

H. Cash

The Foundation recognizes all demand deposit accounts as cash and cash equivalents. It is the policy of the Foundation to consider money market accounts with brokers as other short-term investments.

I. Investments

Investments are recorded at fair value. The fair values of all investments other than real estate are based on quoted market prices and other observable inputs such as quoted prices for similar assets, quoted prices in inactive markets, or inputs corroborated by observable market data. Both realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the accompanying statement of activities based on restrictions put in place by the donor.

J. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying amounts at June 30, 2021 for cash and cash equivalents, investments, pledges receivable, and accounts payable, approximate their fair values. See Note 6 for investments.

K. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

The Foundation invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying statement of financial position.

L. Contributions Receivable

Contributions receivable are unconditional promises to give that are recognized as contributions when the promise is received. Contributions receivable that are expected to be collected in less than one year are reported at net realizable value. Contributions receivable that are expected to be collected in more than one year are reported at fair value at the date of promise. That fair value is computed using a present value technique applied to anticipated cash flows. Amortization of the resulting discount is recognized as additional contribution revenue. Management has determined that no allowance for uncollectible accounts is necessary.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued).

M. Income Taxes

Income taxes are not provided for in the financial statements since the Foundation is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and similar state provisions. The Foundation is not classified as a private foundation. The Foundation files its Form 990 annually with the Internal Revenue Service. The Foundation believes it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. The Foundation's Form 990's are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service generally for three years after they were filed. The returns for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2019, June 30, 2020 and June 30, 2021 are still subject to examination as of the date of this report.

N. Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In September 2020, the FASB issued ASU 2020-07, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets, which enhances disclosure requirements for recognized contributed nonfinancial assets and contributed services for not-for-profit entities. ASU 2020-07 is effective for annual periods beginning after June 15, 2021, which would be fiscal year 2022 for the Foundation, and early adoption is permitted. The Foundation is currently evaluating the impact of that ASU 2020-07 will have on its financial reporting.

Note 2 - Net Assets with Donor Restrictions.

Note 3 - Concentration of Credit Risk.

The Foundation maintains cash balances at one financial institution. The account at the institution is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At June 30, 2021, the Foundation did have cash in excess of the insurance limit. As of June 30, 2021, the bank balance of cash held in financial institutions was \$359,586. These deposits are insured up to \$250,000 which leaves a balance of \$109,586 as uncollateralized and uninsured deposits.

The Foundation maintains all of its investments with Merrill Lynch.

Note 4 - Non-Cash Contributions.

The Foundation receives a variety of non-cash contributions. For the year ended June 30, 2021, the foundation received \$12,031 in non-cash contributions that were included in revenues and expensed in the statement of activities. Following is a summary of these items:

Note 5 - Contingencies.

The Foundation invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying statement of financial position.

On March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 virus outbreak to be a pandemic. Management has evaluated the potential impact of the pandemic on the entity's operations. As of September 28, 2022, there have been no adverse effects on revenue or related expenses incurred by the foundation; however there is still uncertainty regarding the long term effects the pandemic will have on the entity's revenues and related expenses.

Note 7 - Fair Value Measurements.

FASB ASC 820-10, Fair Value Measurements, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The fair value hierarchy established in FASB ASC 820-10 prioritizes the inputs used in valuation techniques into three levels as follows:

Level 1	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
Level 2	Inputs to valuation methodology include: Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets. Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets. Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability. Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by

observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Note 8 - Contributions Receivable.

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Foundation that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions. When the restriction expires, the net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions. Contributions receivable at June 30, 2021, amounted to \$50,000, and are due in increments of \$5,000 through the fiscal year ended June 30, 2031. These receivables have been discounted at 8.2% which is the estimated annual rate of return on an annuity at June 30, 2021.

Withdrawal rates, pre-retirement mortality rates, disability rates and service retirement rates were also adjusted to more closely reflect actual experience.

The assumed rates of salary increase were adjusted to more closely reflect actual and anticipated experience.

The price inflation and investment rate of return assumptions were changed from 3.50% to 3.00% and 8.00% to 7.75% respectively.

2016:

The assumed rate of interest credited to employee contributions was changed from 3.50% to 2.00%.

2017:

The expectation of retired life mortality was changed to the RP-2014 Healthy Annuitant Blue Collar Mortality Table projected with Scale BB to 2022. Small adjustments were also made to the Mortality Table for disabled lives.

The wage inflation assumption was reduced from 3.75% to 3.25%.

Withdrawal rates, pre-retirement mortality rates, disability rates and service retirement rates were also adjusted to more closely reflect actual experience.

The percentage of active member disabilities assumed to be in the line of duty was increased from 6% to 7%.

2019:

The expectation of retired life mortality was changed to the PubS.H-2010(B) Retiree Table with the following adjustments: for males, 112% of male rates from ages 18 to 75 scaled down to 105% for ages 80 to 119; for females, 85% of the female rates from ages 18 to 65 scaled up to 102% for ages 75 to 119; and projection scale MP-2018 will be used to project future improvements in life expectancy generationally.

The expectation of disabled mortality was changed to PubT.H-2010 Disabled Retiree Table for disabled retirees with the following adjustments: for males, 137% of male rates at all ages; for females, 115% of female rates at all ages; and projection scale MP-2018 will be used to project future improvements in life expectancy generationally.

B. Changes of benefit terms

2016:

Effective July 1, 2016, the interest rate on employee contributions shall be calculated based on the money market rate as published by the Wall Street Journal on December 31 of each preceding year with a minimum rate of one percent and a maximum rate of five percent.

C. Method and Assumptions Used in Calculations of Actuarially Determined Contributions.

The actuarially determined contribution rates in the schedule of employer contributions are calculated as of June 30, two years prior to the end of the fiscal year in which contributions are reported (June 30, 2018 valuation for the June 30, 2020 fiscal year end). Note 1 - Basis of Presentation
